In Sanderlings (pre-school), we have been enjoying getting stuck into our new topic, Dangerous Dinosaurs! Each week, we focus on a new key text which helps to theme our learning. We have looked at If I had a dinosaur by Gabby Dawnay and Cave Baby by Julia Donaldson so far. We have enjoyed learning about prehistoric dinosaurs, cave paintings and the explored colour mixing. We were even visited by Animals 2 U South West, who introduced us to hissing cockroaches, crested geckos and bearded dragons! We can't wait to get stuck in further to this wonderful topic.





In Sandpipers we have started our new topic 'Dangerous Dinosaurs.' We have already enjoyed lots of continuous provision opportunities linked to the stories 'If I had a dinosaur' and '

Cave baby.' We have been learning about fossils and prehistoric animals including the 'dangerous dinosaurs!'

We have continued to make good progress in our daily phonics lessons and we are using this in reading and writing activities. We have also been exploring rhyming words, linked to our books in English/Literacy.

In Maths we have been exploring length and height. We have been welly throwing and cutting, comparing and measuring lengths of different materials as well as building towers to measure, count and compare.



In PE we have been loving our new games block of learning with all the exciting new skills and games for us to learn and enjoy.





In Curlews, we have continued our Geography topic 'Coastline' by learning how to understand maps, which show the human and physical features a place has, using symbols on a key. We have also been finding out about coastal erosion, which had a big impact on the local area when

the trainline was damaged in 2014. We used a model to see how the waves can wash away the cliff, which can mean that buildings fall too.

We have finished our English unit based on 'Previously' by Allan Ahlberg, and have now started a unit of non-fiction, with an explanation text about the life cycle of a sunflower. This builds on our Science topic about growing plants. We have also finished our Art topic 'Flowerhead', by creating our own flower models, inspired by Yayoi Kusama. We are now moving on to our Technology unit, 'Beach Hut', where we will explore and build model structures.

February welcomed lots of opportunity for Avocets. We began working on our Music project where we composed our own song and are now tweaking and improving it, ready for the big performance this half term.

On the final week of term, it was 'Children's Mental Health Week' so Avocets spent some time understanding the term 'mental health' and how they can support theirs when life gets a bit tricky! We spent some time thinking of when we have been proud of ourselves, in and out of school.



To start Spring 2, we had a fantastic Cricket session with Niall who supported the children's batting and fielding skills. This will definitely help with our PE this term, with Mrs Vanderford.





Kittiwakes have been busy investigating the weather, as part of our Seasonal Change topic, in Science. So far, we have talked about the wind and watched it blow our windsock about. You may have seen it in the playground. We have been using the beaufort scale to measure the wind's strength.

We have also started an investigation about the Sun's UV light. Keep and eye out on our School FaceBook page to find out more about that.







This term **Oystercatchers** have been working on Shape poems! We all discussed our favourite animals and then wrote poems using similes, metaphors, adjectives and interesting verbs. After that, we found images of our favourite animals and used them as templates. We write our poems around the shape of the animals to make these amazing shape poems!









Razorbills have been continuing to work on their Frozen Kingdoms topic – most recently thinking about the impact of Climate Change on the polar regions. We considered the effect global warming and rising sea levels will have on the Arctic

and the Antarctic and the impact it will have on the animals that live there.

I am sure you will all be aware of the fabulous art project Razorbills took part in. Local artist Alistair Lambert came into school and ran a workshop teaching children how to take art from 2D collage to a 3D diorama. They focused on the sea birds that our classes are named after. The results were very impressive so we invited parents in for an art exhibition! Every class in the school is now proudly displaying their bird in their classroom.

In PE we have been honing our cricket skills. We took part in a cricket skills session where we developed our bowling and batting tecniques.
